Dear Chairman Mica:

On behalf of the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce, the state's largest business trade association representing over 2700 member companies, I am writing to express our concern about the recent actions of U.S. EPA that are greatly affecting the nation's mining industry and Kentucky's economy as a whole.

Kentucky is proud to be the nation's third largest coal producer, the nation's third largest automobile producer and the nation's leading aluminum producer – all of these industries rely directly or indirectly on the security and stability of permits issued by U.S. EPA. The uncertainty that U.S. EPA has created around 401, 402, and/or 404 permits in the mining industry is also starting to hit home in other industries across the state. Therefore, our Chamber supports the efforts to restore the authority already granted to individual states under the Clean Water Act. This authority will allow states to run their own programs as they see fit as it relates to water quality certifications and determine applicable water quality standards.

The Kentucky Chamber feels the Clean Water Cooperative Federalism Act of 2011 is a solid first step in helping return a balance of power between states and federal agencies. This act would help establish what is best in regards to our nation's waters by allowing the states to have a voice in saying what is in their best interests for their residents and economy.
